





A Summer Tale of four Sisters, Two Rabbits, and a Very Interesting Boy By Jeanne Birdsall J/Fic/Birdsall


Simon vs. the Homo Sapiens Agenda by Becky Albertalli Y/Fic/Albertalli


Mockingbird


Rain Reign by Ann M. Martin J/Fic/Martin

After she dies in a car crash, teenaged Samantha relives the day of her death over and over again until, on the seventh day, she finally discovers a way to save herself.




Ghost by Jason Reynolds J/Fic/Reynolds


Far from the Tree by Robin Benway Y/Fic/Benway
